# AHEAD OF NSN'S 50<sup>TH</sup> ANNIVERSARY, BOARD VOTES UNANIMOUSLY TO JOIN AMERICANS FOR THE ARTS

Beginning this month, NSN celebrates its  $50^{\text{th}}$  year as the United States' national organization for storytellers.

On this 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary, I would like to recognize our 23 formative years—from 1975 to 1998—our organization spent unified with the International Storytelling Center, first as the National Association for the Preservation and Perpetuation of Storytelling (NAPPS) and then the National Storytelling Association (NSA). We wish the International Storytelling Center our sincere congratulations as their organization's reaches this 50<sup>th</sup> year milestone while in fellowship with the storytelling community at the National Storytelling Festival in Jonesborough, Tennessee this month.

I would also like to recognize NSN's rich heritage as a powerful voice advocating for storytellers. At our 2025 annual conference in Georgia, I learned from former NSN president Jo Radner of our organization's deciding role, decades ago, in the successful movement to advocate for the National Endowment for the Arts to include storytelling as a category on their federal grant application...continued »

Today, arts funders from the local to state to regional level show widespread adoption of storytelling as a category for arts grants.

Amid these reckless federal cuts to the arts, all of these very grants are now at risk. By my own tally from conversations at our conference and since then, NSN member organizations have lost over \$100,000 from revocation of federal arts funding at both the National Endowment from the Arts (NEA) and the National Endowment from the Humanities (NEH).

From valuable conversations at our Georgia conference around our role as storytellers in this toxic new climate, one of my three key priorities for NSN has become reclaiming our mantle as the national advocacy organization for storytellers. As a result, I am pleased to announce that this September, the NSN Board of Directors unanimously voted to join Americans for the Arts, the leading national coalition of over 150,000 artists and arts organizations advocating against cuts to the NEA and NEH. This action also secures us membership in the Americans for the Arts Action Fund—their affiliate organization permitted to engage in arts activism and political activity—and confers a range of benefits we can provide the NSN membership. The board has tasked the NSN Strategic Planning Committee with examining how our organization can engage in these benefits for our membership—more to come on this soon.

To close this 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary letter, I want to invite you to join us on a very special project that will be ongoing through the next year and will be showcased at our 2026 and 2027 conferences. NSN Immediate Past President Delanna Reed has agreed to chair a wide-ranging oral history initiative seeking to relate and preserve the history of the first 50 years of our organization through the stories of our members and leaders over the years. As the committee is formed, we will have more ways to engage with this project.

At this point, we ask to please contact <u>delanna@storynet.org</u> if you were involved in the development and governance of NAPPS, NSA, or NSN throughout its early history—especially from 1975–1990. We are interested in collecting your recorded stories.

# TEXAS 2026 NATIONAL STORYTELLING CONFERENCE CALL FOR PROPOSALS

Set against the open landscapes of the Texas Panhandle and the vistas of Palo Duro Canyon, this conference invites storytellers to gather where tradition meets innovation. From the voices of those native to the land to contemporary storytellers, Prairie Voices: Honoring Heritage, Inspiring Tomorrow celebrates the ways stories connect generations, communities, and experiences. Together, we'll explore how the wisdom of the past informs the stories of today and inspires the voices of tomorrow.

Your proposal submission can be edited after submitting until the proposal deadline. For those seeking to submit multiple proposals, you must submit one application per proposal.

#### **Terms and Presenter Benefits**

- 1. We welcome proposal submissions from anyone by November 15, 2025. Presenters are not required to be members of NSN, but 80% of sessions must be presented by NSN members.
- 2. Each selected presenter of a 90-minute presentation will receive \$100 off registration.
- 3. Morning activity leader receives \$100 off registration for three 30-minute sessions.
- 4. Proposals will be evaluated for: (a) quality of program, (b) clarity of intent, (c) practicality of process, (d) expertise of presenter on this topic, (e) interest to general membership or to applications of storytelling (Special Interest Groups), and (f) diversity of presentation.
- 5. All applicants will be notified of their acceptance or rejection by e-mail sent on or before January 31, 2026.
- 6. All applicants receiving notification of acceptance must email their acceptance confirmation to NSN by February 15, 2026 —failure to respond by the deadline may result in withdrawal of the offer to present. We will also request a high-quality electronic photo (300 dpi or higher) and a 30-word biography for publicity.

# NSN'S PRO SIG ANNOUNCES NEW PEER CONSULTING PROGRAM

Looking for guidance from PRO peers on topics related to starting, organizing, or managing storytelling events? Apply for a PRO Peer Consulting Session, a one-on-one professional development opportunity for new and emerging storytelling event organizers to learn from seasoned experts! Applicants can select from a list of seasoned PRO experts on a variety of topics for individual consulting sessions, paid for with a PRO stipend.

#### Here's how it works:

- 1.Browse the <u>PRO Consultants List</u> by topic and select a consultant you would like to work with one-on-one. 2.Fill out a <u>short application form</u> and submit to PRO by hitting "submit".
- 3. The application will be reviewed by our PRO panel to determine availability of funds, appropriateness, etc., and the proposed consultant will be contacted.
- 4.If approved and the consultant is available, you will be notified and put in touch with the consultant. You will communicate directly with the consultant to set up meeting time(s), etc.
- 5.PRO pays the consultant upon completion of the session(s).

### **Program FAQs**

- What kinds of "consulting sessions" are offered?
  - These are meant to be brief consultations only, to work on specific questions or topics. This is an opportunity for one-on-one consultation. They are not meant for long-term mentoring or ongoing learning. They are also offered outside of any planned PRO workshops or presentations that are open to the general public. Applicants can apply for 1, 2 or 3 hours. The maximum is 3 hours; Consultants will get paid \$100/hr by PRO.
- Is this peer consulting program open only to PRO members?
  - NO it's open to all NSN members.
- Is there a cost to me as the applicant?
  - The program is free for PRO SIG members. Other NSN members may join the SIG for \$25. Questions?
     Contact Lisa Overholser (<u>nsnprozoomadmin1@storynet.org</u>, or <u>linlis334343@hotmail.com</u>). PRO is piloting this peer consulting program, and has budgeted funds for consultants to be paid, at no cost to the applicant.



- What is the goal of this program?
  - Although our group meets monthly and organizes special public workshops and presentations, we
    find that our PRO members sometimes want to learn more from other PRO members how did they
    handle this specific problem? What tools were used to accomplish this task? We hope to further the
    storytelling production knowledge of our larger community by drawing upon the wealth of knowledge
    of our members.
- Is there a deadline to apply?
  - No, applications will be accepted on a rolling basis, as long as funding lasts. The pilot period is the
     2025 calendar year.




