NSN'S BOARD VOTES UNANIMOUSLY TO ADOPT STATEMENT ON CULTURAL EQUITY

I'm very happy to share that this October, the NSN Board of Directors voted unanimously to adopt a Statement on Cultural Equity for our organization. Following on our action last month to join Americans for the Arts (AFTA) and its national coalition standing up for the arts, an NSN committee consisting of vice chair-elect Darlene Richard, director-at-large Gwendolyn Napier, NSN member and acclaimed diversity consultant Susan O'Halloran, and chaired by our vice chair Caleb Hubbard, drafted the cultural equity statement, drawing upon a framework designed for AFTA member organizations.

I would like to recognize Caleb and the committee for the exceptional voice they crafted for our organization in this statement: thoughtful, incisive, and clear on our stand, as storytellers, on the importance of preserving equity and promoting belonging among underrepresented voices in our community. Please read the statement on the next page.

We will have more to share in the coming months, but look forward to engaging with AFTA on their upcoming *50 Stories*, *50 States campaign* to mobilize storytellers in the effort to save our federal arts infrastructure.

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NATIONAL STORYTELLING NETWORK STATEMENT ON CULTURAL EQUITY

The National Storytelling Network believes that everyone deserves the chance to live a full and creative life. We commit to supporting practices of cultural equity that help build a nation where all voices are welcomed, included, and valued.

"Cultural equity embodies the values, policies, and practices that ensure that all people—including but not limited to those who have been historically underrepresented based on race/ethnicity, age, disability, sexual orientation, gender, gender identity, socioeconomic status, geography, citizenship status, or religion—are represented in the development of arts policy; the support of artists; the nurturing of accessible, thriving venues for expression; and the fair distribution of programmatic, financial, and informational resources."

What We Recognize, What We Believe

In order to live out our mission, we begin by recognizing the realities that shape our world and affirming the values that guide our storytelling community.

- Throughout history some voices have been lifted up while others have been silenced. As storytellers, we thrive to recognize the current and historical systems of power and privilege. These inequities still exist and must be recognized, challenged, and changed.
- Cultural equity is essential for storytelling to thrive, because every culture's stories carries wisdom, truth, and value.
- We hold ourselves accountable to creating space for voices that have been overlooked, knowing that true change comes through listening, sharing, and building together.
- Every individual deserves the opportunity to tell and hear stories that reflect the fullness of human experience; this is vital to a healthy, connected, and democratic society.
- Storytellers help us imagine new possibilities and confront injustice. By centering diverse stories, we illuminate inequities and inspire alternatives.

Growing Through Story & Practice

To live into our values of cultural equity, we commit to modeling them in how we work, listen, and tell stories. We recognize that this is ongoing work, and we approach it with humility and care.

- We acknowledge that we are all learners. We do not know what we do not know, and we commit to curiosity, reflection, and growth as individuals and as a community.
- We recognize that each of us carries responsibility for the impact of our words and actions. While harm is rarely intended, we hold ourselves accountable when it occurs and strive to repair and learn from it.
- We seek to improve our communication skills—listening deeply, speaking honestly, and telling stories with respect—so that together we can grow as a stronger, more inclusive storytelling community.
- We commit to examining and addressing inequities in our policies, systems, and programs, and to sharing our progress openly.
- We dedicate time and resources to ensure that our leadership reflects the many voices and stories that make up our society.

Shaping Tomorrow's Story

To ensure that equity is not just an ideal but a lived reality, we commit to nurturing growth across the storytelling community.

- We encourage ongoing learning and reflection so that storytellers and audiences alike can expand their cultural awareness and foster practices that welcome every voice.
- We strengthen the storytelling pipeline by supporting programs, opportunities, and leadership that reflect the true diversity of our communities.
- We advocate for policies and partnerships—public and private—that uplift cultural equity and ensure all stories have space to be told and heard.
- We believe progress happens when we listen to one another, hold space for different experiences, and create opportunities for future generations of storytellers to flourish.

At the National Storytelling Network, cultural equity is not just a principle—it is part of how we live our mission, vision, and values. Guided by our belief in the power of storytelling to connect, inspire, and build respect, we commit to advancing cultural equity in every aspect of our work. This means lifting up underrepresented voices, engaging diverse communities with care, collaborating with integrity, and adapting to meet the needs of a changing world. By practicing cultural equity, we ensure that storytelling remains a vital, inclusive, and transformative force for all people.

TEXAS 2026 NATIONAL STORYTELLING CONFERENCE—LAST CALL FOR PROPOSALS

Celebrating the Past, Investigating the Present, and Planning for the Future

Planning for the 2026 NSN Summer Conference on the campus of West Texas A&M is underway. We invite you to submit a proposal for the conference, Prairie Voices, Honoring Heritage, Inspiring Tomorrow, which takes place July 23-26 in Canyon, Texas.

As noted in the call for proposals, here are the terms and benefits:

- 1. We welcome proposal submissions from anyone by November 15, 2025. Presenters are not required to be members of NSN, but 80% of sessions must be presented by NSN members.
- 2. Each selected presenter of a 90-minute presentation will receive \$100 off registration. Morning activity leader receives \$100 off registration for three 30-minute sessions.
- 3. Proposals will be evaluated for: (a) quality of program, (b) clarity of intent, (c) practicality of process, (d) expertise of presenter on this topic, (e) interest to general membership or to applications of storytelling (Special Interest Groups), and (f) diversity of presentation.
- 4. All applicants will be notified of their acceptance or rejection by e-mail sent on or before January 31,
- 5. All applicants receiving notification of acceptance must email their acceptance confirmation to NSN by February 15, 2026 —failure to respond by the deadline may result in withdrawal of the offer to present. We will also request a high-quality electronic photo (300 dpi or higher) and a 30-word biography for publicity.

Session categories include the following:

- Workshops (90 min.): Practical, interactive learning experiences.
- Presentations (90 min.): Sessions on in-depth topics, innovative projects, etc.
- Panels/roundtable discussions (90 min.): Limit 4 presenters, including the moderator.
- Coaching (90 min.): Group coaching for a limited number of participants who sign up in advance.
- Early morning activity (30 min.): Exercise, meditation, dance, music

We encourage submissions that focus on the area and its history, but also welcome exploration of current topics in storytelling, and sessions that encourage us to examine the part technology plays in the stories we create and share. We want to celebrate the past, investigate the present and plan for the future.



The WTAMU campus offers outstanding performing venues, top of the line technology for presentation, and is located just a 20 minute drive from Palo Duro Canyon, the grand canyon of Texas, and home to the longest running outdoor musical "Texas." 


