NATIONAL STORYTELLING SUMMIT STORY SLAMS

You are invited to participate in the 2019 National Storytelling Summit Story Slams. Participants have three chances to take part in the Slam with two preliminary qualifying Slams and the Grand Slam. Anyone attending the Summit is eligible to participate in the Slams. All types of stories may be told – traditional and personal but must be told in the first person (no props and no reading from the page) and the five-minute stories need to relate to the Summit theme - Story Now.

Each slam will have judges picked from the audience with timekeepers, scorekeepers and a nononsense host picking ten names from a hat. The scoring system will be based on a 0-10 rating. The top three from the first qualifier go to the final. The top three from the second qualifier, go to the final. Four additional tellers will be drawn from a hat before the start of the Final. The Final or the Grand Slam will include a total of ten participants. Qualifiers do not need to tell the same story in the final. Cash prizes awarded for 1st, 2nd and 3rd place winners during the Grand Slam.



The Magic of Podcasts	S	Salon 6

This class examines each of the ingredients needed to create a superlative narrative style podcast. What kinds of stories are told best via podcast? How can we blend writing, interview, and sound to a create dynamic, compelling story? How can we best enhance the experience of being alone with someone else's voice in your headphones?

Podcasts traffic in empathy and emotionality. This master class will teach techniques for capitalizing on the medium's strengths. We will discuss how to find and produce powerful stories from a broad spectrum of human experiences, and how to enable people from a diverse range of backgrounds to tell their own stories.

After a quick introduction to the medium and the industry, this class will break down the three basic elements of strong podcast storytelling: interviewing for a story, writing for the ear, and using verité.

This class will include careful listening and dissection of some of the most compelling podcast stories in the narrative genre, analysis of masterful and less masterful podcast scripts, and strategies for successful podcast story finding, mapping, and planning.

The workshop includes:

- Podcast interview exercises
- Podcast pitch activities
- Story mapping techniques
- Sound gathering strategies

Anna Sussman is the Managing Editor and Senior Producer of WNYC's Snap Judgment, a weekly radio program and podcast airing on over 400 NPR stations nationally. She teaches the Advanced Radio class at the University of California at Berkeley's Graduate School of Journalism. She has reported on the ground from 15 countries and also plays the banjo.

Personal Storytelling George Dawes Green, Founder of The Moth Salon 1

Each participant will come prepared with a three-minute story that is personal and somewhat self-challenging. We will explore the essential workings of personal storytelling focusing on the moment of decision, using "buried treasure" hearing your own personal voice, the power of authenticity, finding the revelatory detail, and making personal stakes universal. Throughout the master class participants will prepare and share a one-minute and three-minute story to each other, with time to discuss and re-present.

- Examine the primary and multi-faceted role of these oral historians both men and women (griottes/jalimuso) and their relationships with their respective family and community groups.
- Reflect upon, identify and articulate our individual sense of our role as storyteller in our communities – now.
- Identify where aspects of the jali's role intersect with our individual and collective paths and goals.
- Identify needs/issues in your community the storyteller or storytelling might effectively address.
- Claim and renew our commitment to our role, our work, our mission, our communities.

Building Blocks of Revolutionary Theater Marie Cartier Salon 3

The San Francisco Mime Troupe has been creating theater that pushes boundaries, challenges power structures and fights for justice for the last 60 years. An introduction to the Mime Troupe's mission and style, this highly interactive workshop will consist of a series of exercises designed to help generate and structure ideas for performance that addresses political and social issues. Participants will be asked to work collectively and in small groups. Including improvisation, Commedia Dell'Arte, tableau, and games derived from Augusto Boal's Theater of the Oppressed, we will take the topics that most concern YOU and see how we can address them through storytelling and theater.

Marie Cartier is a multidisciplinary artist born and raised, living and working in San Francisco. A trained actor, her work in theater also spans everything from light and sound operation to props design, education, and writing. As a newly-minted collective member at the San Francisco Mime Troupe, she serves as co-artistic director and helps with day to day operations of the company. 

Ohlone Welcome and Land Acknowledgement Kanyon Sayers-Roods (Hahashkani), Costanoan Ohlone and Chumash



Kanyon Sayers-Roods is Costanoan Ohlone and Chumash; she also goes by her given Native name, Hahashkani, which in Chumash means "Coyote Woman". She is proud of her heritage and her native name (though it comes with its own back-story) and is very active in the Native Community. She is an Artist, Poet, Published Author, Activist, Student and Teacher. Kanyon's art has been featured at the De Young Museum, The Somarts Gallery, Snag Magazine, and numerous Powwows and Indigenous Gatherings.



A Land Acknowledgement is a formal statement that recognizes and respects Indigenous Peoples as traditional stewards of this land and the enduring relationship that exists between Indigenous Peoples and their traditional territories.



To recognize the land:

To recognize the land is an expression of gratitude and appreciation to those whose territory you reside on, and a way of honoring the Indigenous people who have been living and working on the land from time immemorial. It is important to understand the long standing history that has brought you to reside on the land, and to seek to understand your place within that history. Land acknowledgements do not exist in a past tense, or historical context: colonialism is a current ongoing process, and we need to build our mindfulness of our present participation. It is also worth noting that acknowledging the land is Indigenous protocol.

The Essence of Personal Storytelling George Dawes Green, Founder of The Moth

What's inspired the recent explosive rise in personal storytelling? Why do we find these tales so compelling? My talk will address new research into the neuroscientific basis of storteylling; homo sapiens as the storytelling animal. I'll look at the rise of the personal vision in art since the late fifteenth century (the near simultaneous development of the soliloquy in English drama and the aria in Italian music; the popularity of the first-person novel in the eighteenth century; the 'confessional' monologues of Spaulding Gray). I'll talk about my inspiration for creating the Moth, our epoch's particular craving for the personal and authentic, and the powerful pull of unscripted first-person stories. I'll show videos of one-minute stories by some of our outstanding Moth raconteurs, and work with the audience to tease out the underlying principles of the raconteur's art.

People Lover, Word Weaver, Storyteller, and self-described "God's Fool" – Brother Blue (the late Hugh Morgan Hill) declared that his stories were told "from the middle of the middle of me, to the middle of the middle of you". This community reflects the heart and soul of storytelling's presence and visibility on the American cultural landscape. We have been at the middle of storytelling advocacy for decades, finding ourselves repeatedly challenged to define and justify not just the art form but its legitimacy as well. We are in schools, universities, theaters, museums, detention centers and corporate environments. Story practitioners are in the middle of innovative collaborations with scientific and mental health communities including NASA and NIH. Yet, as a group, we are graying with few young'uns following in our traditional teller footsteps and after 29 years of performing full-time, I still get the question: "Now, what is it you say you do?"

Storyteller, NSN and NABS member, Charlotte Blake Alston will take a moment to acknowledge, affirm – yea, even unapologetically celebrate – the range and depth of our collective work, but also consider questions about the future of storytelling – and perhaps more importantly, the NOW of storytelling. Is there a place for us in the middle of today's predominant socio-political narratives? Does what we do still have relevance in today's artistic, cultural and political climate? Is the question of relevancy even a relevant question? She'll speak from the middle of her middle.







NSN ORACLE AWARDS

The National Storytelling Network (NSN) values our members and their art by annually recognizing individuals and organizations for their outstanding contributions to storytelling by presenting them with an ORACLE Award.

Now is the time to start thinking about honoring a deserving storyteller or storytelling supporter through the NSN ORACLE Awards in 2020. The NSN ORACLE Award Categories are Lifetime Achievement, Circle of Excellence, Regional Excellence, Distinguished National Service, Talking Leaves, International StoryBridge, and Regional Service and Leadership.

The NSN ORACLE committee only gives awards that come through YOUR nominations. It's up to each of you to recognize those deserving folks who may otherwise be overlooked. All nominations require a nomination form, narrative addressing qualifications, and three (3) letters of support.

Nomination for the Regional Excellence Award is the only award that requires a video sample. This category recognizes the creativity, professional integrity, and artistic contributions of tellers who have greatly enriched the Storytelling culture of their region. Note: A video is required with this nomination since the evaluation committee may be unfamiliar with the nominee's Storytelling work.

Please be careful to address the criteria of each separate award in your nomination, particularly keeping in mind the differences between Regional Excellence (evaluating a candidate's performance skills) and Regional Service & Leadership (evaluating a candidate's service & leadership actions).


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
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
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
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NSN Future Summit Call for Location Proposals

NATIONAL
Is your guild or organization interested in hosting an NSN National Storytelling
STORYTELLING
Summit in your area? NSN is actively seeking partners for the 2021-2024 Summits.

NETWORK
Here is the scheduled rotation:

- **2021: North Central Region** (Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Michigan, Minnesota, Nebraska, North Dakota, Ohio, South Dakota, Wisconsin)
- 2022: Mid-Atlantic Region (Delaware, District of Columbia, Maryland, New Jersey, New York City (Metro), Pennsylvania, Virginia, West Virginia)
- 2023: Western Region (Arizona, Colorado, Idaho, Montana, Nevada, New Mexico, Utah, Wyoming)
- **2024: Northeast Region** (Connecticut, Maine, Massachusetts, New Hampshire, Upstate New York, Rhode Island, Vermont)

NSN requests interested groups submit a Statement of Interest by **midnight**, **September 1**, **2019**. Full preliminary proposal applications will be accepted through **midnight**, **October 1**, **2019**.

What does hosting an NSN Summit involve?

A National Summit Oversight Committee and Local Summit Host Committee work in tandem with the NSN staff to plan and produce the National Storytelling Summit. Together, all parties strive to create a high quality educational and entertaining experience for attendees, as well as a financial success for NSN.

NSN depends on the Local Host Committee to provide information, support, and/or assist in the management of logistics (transportation, lodging, food, local opportunities, volunteer coordination, local publicity, equipment/technology coordination, directional signage, etc.) Additionally, NSN relies on the Local Host Committee to assist with Summit fundraising, particularly in obtaining grants and sponsorships that might be unique to the area, as well as in-kind contributions such as providing technology equipment, signage, etc. Finally, the Local Host Committee will also seek to engage local talent and audiences outside of NSN's typical attendee base.

The Local Host Committee will have some autonomy to make decisions within an established framework of the budget, timeline, and processes, but due to ultimate accountability, the National Summit Oversight Committee will have final approval on decisions made.

What's in it for you?

Hosting the National Storytelling Summit in your area is a great deal of work, and can be tremendously rewarding. One obvious benefit is having the Summit, with all its opportunities, right in your backyard, limiting travel expenses. Assisting in Summit planning can provide excellent networking opportunities and experience to help with future local and regional events. The performances and workshops give many local tellers an opportunity for exposure to a national audience and the chance to learn from seasoned professionals whom they might not otherwise meet. Additionally, we hope the connections you develop with other local artists, organizations, and venues will continue to help your organization grow long after the Summit is over.



Who may apply?

<u>Any</u> interested guild or organization may apply to host the National Storytelling Summit in their area, as long as the guild or organization maintains current organizational membership in NSN. The local committee chair and primary anticipated committee members must maintain individual memberships in NSN.

How to apply?

<u>Step 1:</u> E-mail a **Statement of Interest** with the subject line *Summit Statement of Interest* to NSN at **events@storynet.org** by **midnight (CST), September 1, 2019**. This email needs to contain:

- 1. the name of the guild(s) and/or organization(s) interested in hosting the Summit,
- 2. the city/state proposed (see rotation schedule above), and
- 3. at least one key contact person's name, phone number, and email

<u>Step 2:</u> Email a follow-up preliminary application form with the subject line *Summit Location Proposal* to **events@storynet.org** by **midnight (CST), October 1, 2019**, answering the following questions:

- 1. What is the name of the guild(s) and/or organization(s) interested in hosting the National Storytelling Summit?
- 2. Where do you propose hosting the National Storytelling Summit? (city, state and a list of potential host sites such as hotels, conference centers, retreat centers, colleges, etc).
- 3. We anticipate scheduling the Summit so that it ends on the last Sunday of July (i.e. July 22-25, 2021; July 28-31, 2022; July 27-30, 2023; July 25-28, 2024). If your group would like to propose an alternate schedule, please provide an explanation (e.g. coordinating with local events).
- 4. Who will be the local chair? (give the name, brief bio experience, and contact information)
- 5. List other key organizations and local committee members. (give names, contact info, experience, etc.)
- 6. List potential sponsors and other funding sources in the area.
- 7. List potential partners in the area (regional arts councils, performance venues, storytelling advocates, fringe festivals, etc.)
- 8. Explain why you want to host the Summit and why your location would be a good fit for NSN.
- 9. Describe your vision of how the Summit would be executed or any unique ideas that you have outside the standard NSN National Storytelling Summit model.
- 10. Describe the transportation, food, and lodging options available for attendees (for example: are there shuttles from the airport? Is there a variety of places to eat within walking distance of the Summit? Are there a variety of lodging options close together to suit varying budgets?)

PLEASE NOTE: The National Summit Oversight Committee will review proposals and pass recommendations on to the NSN Board to be approved during the October 2019 board meeting. By **November 5, 2019**, we will notify applicants whether they are under consideration and, if so, what the next steps/timeline will be.


