PRESIDENT'S LETTER

INTO THE DARK AND BACK

For me, the change from Daylight Savings Time to standard time brought daylight to a screeching halt, foreshadowing the coming of winter. The Winter Solstice, December 21, will truly mark the shortest day of the year. Cold, dark nights bring a time of contemplation and reflection as we transition into a new year. At the same time, the holidays bustle with activities; traffic, travel, shopping, and parties. As we wind down the year at NSN, we haven't stopped working to strengthen our organization. Our Special Interest Groups have held their last workshops and meetings for the year, while looking and planning ahead for 2025. The national conference committee is reviewing presentation proposals for the July Atlanta conference and fringe applications are being accepted through December 13. The Fringe drawing occurs live on December 15 to select the winners. You can attend via Zoom and be the first to know! Click here to apply.

Thanks to generous donations earned through the fall online auction, we have the funds to reinstate the member grants in 2025! We will be announcing the opening of applications after the first of the year. In addition, NSN has donated to the Storyteller Relief Fund (SRF) managed by Artists Standing Strong Together (ASST, "assist") to aid storytellers impacted by Hurricanes Helene and Milton, as well as other emergencies that come their way. If you need assistance, click here to apply now. The grants have been increased to \$500. We have a limited number of available grants, which is why we will continue to collect donations to that fund throughout the coming year. If you are able to donate, please click on the Donate button on the storynet.org homepage and direct your donations to storyteller disaster relief.

During this time of giving, consider giving your money and time to the National Storytelling Network. Your volunteer board is hard at work to provide services and community to storytellers around the country and the world. Please renew your membership and consider giving a little extra any time you can. If you can't spare the funds, you can volunteer to help on one of our committees by contacting board member Melissa Fees at info@storynet.org. (Put her name in the subject line.)

Thanks to NSN Treasurer Bob Johnson, I now know that if you are 70 ½ or older you can contribute to NSN and get credit for it on your tax return even if you cannot itemize. If you contribute directly from an IRA this will also count as your required minimum distribution (RMD). These are called Qualified Charitable Distributions (QCD). You can satisfy some or all of your RMD and at the same time avoid paying tax on the distribution (which you would if you simply withdrew and sent us a check). Each state has different laws that can affect your contribution so be sure to check with a tax professional. You can <u>read IRS publication 590-B</u>, page 13 for more details. As we look at what is happening in our country and the world, we can grow discouraged by the darkness that surrounds us. But take heart – as storytellers we know the power of story to make the truth palatable and to bring hope instead of despair. 

INSTRUCTIONS FOR THE DIRECTORY

- Go to the website https://storynet.org/
- Scroll down to the page and click the button that says Hire a Teller.
- · Type Cleveland in the Name field.
- My profile will appear. This is how your profile will look.
- Now return to the homepage by clicking on the NSN icon at the top of the page.
- In the upper right corner, login to the website. If you have forgotten your password, there is a option to replace it. If you have forgotten your username, call me at 651-703-8191. DO NOT create a new profile.
- Once your are logged in, you will be transported to the Member Area.
- Look for the box titled Update Directory Info and click it.
- On the next page, click the red wording to update your listing.
- Complete any open fields especially your photo and website URL.
- Types of Stories you may click any number of types that you perform.
- Then click Save.
- You will be transferred to the NSN homepage.
- Click on the Hire a Teller button and enter your last name in the Name field.
- This will bring up your profile. Review for accuracy and repeat this process to make any changes.
- When finished updating your profile, try a few searches to see what the directory is capable of presenting.



The "Hire A Teller" section of the website (www.storynet.org) has been updated and is now operational.

Tellers are beginning to add photos and types of storytelling to really enhance the use of the Directory.




