Jimmy Neil Smith, former teacher, mayor of Jonesborough, Tennessee, and the founder and first President of the International Storytelling Center (ISC) died on March 15 after a long illness. It was through his vision that the National Storytelling Festival began in 1973, leading to the creation of the National Association for the Preservation and Perpetuation of Storytelling (NAPPS), later to be called the National Storytelling Association and finally ISC and NSN. His legacy lives on at ISC in the capable hands of the current board, staff, and President Michael Carson. Jimmy Neil was known and loved by storytellers from around the country. He will be missed. 



Actually, yes...someone would have started it; but I'm the one who did, along with about two dozen others who became the "Southern Order of Storytellers" on a hot August afternoon in 1982. It was in the Cup and Chaucer Coffee Shop of Oxford Bookstore in downtown Atlanta (at Peachtree Battle), where we were first the "Georgia Association of Storytellers" until we said "Oops!" upon recognizing what that acronym would be! (Might be appropriate!).

REMEMBERING

JIMMY NEIL SMITH

Jimmy Neil Smith passed away March 15, 2025 after a lengthy illness. He was 77. Jimmy Neil founded the National Storytelling Festival in Jonesborough, Tennessee and the National Association for the Preservation and Perpetuation of Storytelling (NAPPS). In 1998, NAPPS (Now called the National Storytelling Association) became two organizations: The International Storytelling Center and NSA (soon to be called NSN). For many years the two organizations were connected financially and supported one another.

We honor and appreciate Jimmy Neil for the leadership and vision he provided which contributed to the storytelling revival in the United States.

Here, from his obituary, is the remarkable story of the birth of the National Storytelling Festival: While teaching, Jimmy served as advisor for the high school's newspaper staff. One day while driving students to the Elizabethton Star for production work, comedian Jerry Clower's voice came up on the car radio, telling a tale about raccoon hunting in Mississippi. His storytelling brought mixed reviews from the students, as well as from Jimmy, who noted aloud, "What would you all think about getting people together to tell stories?"

Not long after, Jimmy suggested this very idea to Jonesborough's town leaders. The first festival was held in 1973 in a local high school gymnasium, with Clower taking center stage, along with Bill Monroe and his Bluegrass Boys. The next day people returned to downtown and sat on hay bales as various tellers shared tales extemporaneously from the back of a flatbed truck. Jimmy noted later that these were the moments in which the real magic of storytelling had occurred.

Two years after that first event, Jimmy launched the National Association for the Preservation and Perpetuation of Storytelling (NAPPS), with tellers Doc McConnell, Connie Regan-Blake, Barbara Freeman, Lee Pennington, Kathryn Windham, and Ardi St. Clair serving as its first board of directors. Jimmy and his board planned each festival and worked to network storytellers and listeners across the United States. As audiences grew, huge circus tents were used to accommodate the growing number of listeners. Later on, Jimmy and his staff advanced storytelling by holding workshops and conferences, and through publications such as Yarnspinner and The National Storytelling Journal (later named Storytelling Magazine).

The translation of Cherie Trebon's last name is 'very good' and she was...very good as a storyteller, teacher of storytelling, director of the Forest Storytelling Festival and member of the Seattle Storytellers Guild and the Story People of Clallam County.

She said if anyone had ever told her that she would one day stand in front of an audience and tell a story, she would say they were crazy. It did happen and beyond telling, her ability to teach gave us new tellers. Cherie's skills as director of the Forest Festival resulted in attracting locals as well as returning listeners from throughout the northwest. Her business sense and attention to detail helped to grow the festival. After she stepped down as director, she continued to volunteer her time and talents.

Cherie's home on the water was a place for storytellers to gather.

Her home was a reflection of all she held dear...storytelling, books and a variety of interesting objects that reflected her love of the familiar and the unusual. The dragon wall hanging symbolized the magic she loved.

Cherie passed away on March 1, 2025.

She was honored with the NSN Oracle Award for Regional Service in 2015.

AWARDEE ESSAY

2025 J.J. RENEAUX MENTORSHIP GRANT AWARDEE CHISOM OGOKE'S YEAR OF WONDER

For Chisom Ogoke, her year of intensive practice in storytelling kicked off with preparing for the 40th Annual Texas Storytelling Festival in Denton. There, she gave her first performance as the 2025 J.J. Reneaux Mentorship Grant Awardee.

Chisom is a Nigerian American storyteller who began performing stories in 2023. With the support of the National Cultural Foundation, she was able to explore Nigerian and Caribbean storytelling practices in Barbados as a 2022-2023 U.S. Student Fulbright Scholar. In Barbados, she not only performed her written work for the first time but also learned about the National Storytelling Festival in Jonesborough. After seeing the 2023 Festival for herself—her first ever storytelling festival—Chisom decided to dive in and join the Dallas Storytelling Guild and the Tejas Storytelling Association in her home state of Texas.



She attended the 2024 National Storytelling Network Conference and, during it, gave her first Fringe performance and learned about the J.J. Reneaux Mentorship Award. Since being awarded the mentorship grant in December of 2024, Chisom sees 2025 as a Year of Wonder. A year of working closely with Diane Macklin, a seasoned teller and teaching artist, understanding her own identity as a storyteller, and cultivating richer performances. This includes expanding on the original work she creates from the intersection of her culture, faith, and penchant for folklore. In preparation for her performance during the Denton Festival, Chisom met bi-weekly with Diane in virtual sessions that guided her to develop a deeper relationship with her story, particularly its characters and scenes. The result was Chisom's first Uchenna Tale, the beginning of a series of adventures between a young girl and her guardian angel.

With her Year of Wonder just beginning, Chisom is beyond excited for what lies ahead.

Bio: Chisom Ogoke holds an M.F.A. in creative writing and is a Creative and Performing Arts Fulbright Scholar. She currently works as an English professor for the Alamo Community College District in San Antonio, Texas. When she's not reading, writing, or teaching, she enjoys venturing outside, finding new places to walk that have beautiful views and tiny birds.

James Wilden White, Ph.D. emailed me seeking information as to how he might share his book Gilgamesh to Gierach: Four Thousand years of Fishing, Fish, and Water Stories with the storytelling community. I became curious and wanted to know more about Jim. I perused Jim's website, <u>drjameswildenwhite.com</u> and learned that he is an author, a fly-fisher, a retired ordained minister, and teacher of the United Church of Christ. For over a decade, Jim taught his congregation history and life lessons through storytelling.

Jim is an accomplished travel writer known for his meticulous attention to detail, eloquently describing the scenery, geology, culture, and history of a region. He is the author of Brief Christian Histories, Fly-Fishing the Artic Circle of Tasmania, and Round Boys Great. His most recent publication is Gilgamesh to Gierach: Four Thousand Years of Fishing, Fish, and Water Stories. According to Diehl, a Rocky Mountain Readers reviewer, the stories in this book are simple folktales, historical stories, biblical and saintly stories, and great tragedies. This book contains classical literary characters, such as the Odyssey and Moby Dick, the voices of other fine writers, films, mysteries, nursery rhymes, musicals, and poetry. This plethora of stories will reveal the fish' significance to the reader.




