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

Reflecting on this past year as Chair, I'm amazed at how quickly the time has flown. While there is always more work to be done, I'm proud of what we've accomplished together as a board. Most importantly, we have **cemented a stable foundation** to support NSN's continued growth.

We welcomed two new board positions this year: **Public Relations Director** and **Publications Manager**. Our PR Director Melissa Fees, has made amazing strides toward expanding NSN's social media visibility and our newsletter – thanks to Editor Margaret Read McDonald and Co-editor Rishi Nixon has grown in both content and professional consistency.

Our **Special Interest Groups (SIGs)** have hosted a wide array of swaps and workshops, often free of charge. Dot Cleveland has continued to enhance and streamline our website, making it easier to navigate. We've made steady progress updating our by-laws. And Vice Chair Elect Caleb Hubbard has worked hard to establish committee structures and identify openings. (If you'd like to get involved, we'd love to hear from you! We have a committee for you.)

In addition, Past Chair Trudy Hanson compiled a comprehensive leadership manual to help orient new board members to the workings of our organization.

We've also taken meaningful steps to connect beyond our organization. When hurricanes Helene and Milton struck the Southeast, I reached out to Artists Standing Strong Together (ASST, "assist") to collaborate in raising funds for the Storyteller Relief Fund (SRF), supporting storytellers impacted by the hurricanes and other emergencies.

When we learned that the National Association of Black Storytellers (NABS) lost vital NEA funding, I proposed that NSN contribute to their 2025 fall conference. I'm happy to say the board unanimously agreed. In addition, I met with Michael Carson, President of the International Storytelling Center (ISC) to build collaboration between NSN and ISC. I was encouraged by his enthusiasm for supporting each other in future endeavors. Although we are in the initial stages, they lay the groundwork for more meaningful partnerships with our sister organizations.

In July, I will pass the Chair position to Vice Chair Rishi Nixon. While my term concludes, my involvement with NSN will continue. One way to do that is to celebrate the 50th birthday of NSN. One project I'm especially excited about is organizing a team to collect and record the oral histories of key figures in NSN's 50-year journey. These stories will help preserve our legacy for future generations of storytellers.

Serving on the Board of Directors has been an enriching experience for me. It took me years to commit to this level of engagement, and I am glad I did. I am genuinely thankful for the friendships I've made and will continue to support this vibrant community for years to come.

Thank you for giving me this opportunity to serve. I look forward to what's next—for me, and for NSN.



Crafting and telling difficult stories: A workshop for storytellers, writers and others

Date: July 8, 2025 7:00 pm - 8:30 pm CDT

Everyone needs to know they are not alone in their experiences. Whether through personal narrative, traditional material, games, or fiction, shared stories help us talk about difficult things so we can recognize common ground, find more healing, and help others. Sharing these stories requires special attention to the needs of both the story crafter and the audience. This three-session Zoom workshop (July 8, 15, 22 2025) will help you shape your difficult story so you can share it safely, the audience can experience it deeply without worrying about you or themselves, and will give you the tools you need for a crafted, powerful story. If participants choose, we will have a recital so they can share their stories with others. This workshop is three sessions, held on July 8, 15, and 22 at 7pm CDT. Each session will last no longer than 90 minutes. Attendance is capped at 20 people so everyone can have individual attention. The workshop will not be recorded. You can expect to learn:

- Why telling challenging stories is important
- How to identify these stories
- Crafting techniques to support tellers and listeners
- Ways to determine if a difficult story is ready to tell
- Expert facilitation
- A detailed handout, and more.


